Pastor's Ponderings: Sabbatical Summary -Part 2

The sabbatical is broken into three parts – "Rest" while hiking 14ers is the first part. The second is "Personal Learning." My plan was to learn some construction skills – while operating as the GC (general contractor) at our build site in Hartsel, CO.

What I learned is our plans didn't work as expected.

What I learned is my communication skills are as important as my construction skills.

What I learned is I am not a GC.

Our company had already fabricated the exterior walls, from metal shipping containers, and they were delivered to our property. Setting the foundation and the containers on top, welding and sealing the windows and doors. What we anticipated to be complete by the end of June finished at the end of September. Typical? Yes, and frustrating because the work we planned to do ourselves at the cabin wasn't possible because of their contract with us. Now at the end of October we are still waiting for confirmation that everything we asked them to do has been finished.

The good news is the unexpected and unplanned learning. My goal to finish ten projects (mostly at the cabin), now became projects at home in Greeley. Painting, landscaping, cleaning – those menial tasks that turn meaningful. I had time to make a jewelry box with Anya and create a week of Daddy/daughter days.

I had space and time to work through my reading list – 10 books from my office shelf – another 10 novels on audio. I learned and re-learned the scared space a car provides for me and mental health on endless hours driving through Colorado.

This gift of time – the unplanned days – allowed me to be present to the frustration of the cabin build delays. Still stressful and frustration, but I was able to cope better without the additional burdens of being pastor. In an ironic way, I could be Christian better outside my pastoral role than in it.

Reflecting on the goals of this phase of the sabbatical, I wanted to build relationships with family, create experiences and memories together. While it didn't happen the way we planned it was successful personal learning, with memories and experiences that I wouldn't dream of changing.

Even if my construction skills haven't improved.

Third Quarter Benevolence

"Great News! We ended the 3rd quarter of 2024 with a positive balance of \$17,480. This amount represents the monies available to pay 3rd quarter congregational benevolence. Therefore, we were able to pay 7.5% on the 3rd quarter Ministry Offerings of \$88,643, or \$6,648. PLUS we paid the remaining 2.5% of 1st quarter congregational benevolence in the amount of \$2,283 for a total of \$8,931! As of the end of the 3rd quarter, the total congregational benevolence paid is \$20,174 which is 7.5% of the Ministry Offerings. In addition to congregational benevolence, we have also given \$1,916 to organizations in the Social & Eco Justice budget as well as Faith Formation's and Administration's. This brings total giving to \$22,090."

Small Groups

Quilting has been cutting, sewing, assembling and tying quilts for the past year. On Sunday, October 20 at the joint worship service, approximately 35 guilts were blessed. Two of those guilts will be given to the new Habitat for Humanity homeowners at their home dedication in January. The remaining quilts will be boxed and taken to Urban Servant Corps in Denver. From Denver, they will be shipped to St. Paul, MN where they will be packed onto shipping containers to go to wherever needed. Recently Lutheran World Relief decided to distribute quilts in the US (think Hurricane Helene, Hurricane Milton, wildfires, etc.) in addition to around the world. We are continually amazed at the generosity of the three congregations for donated fabric. We sincerely thank you. Lutheran World Relief thanks you. Those in need thank you! If you'd like to join us, please come; Fridays from 10 am-12 pm NO experience needed, NO need to have been coming last year, NO worries. Hope to see the old familiar as well as new faces.

Highlights from Co-Op Committee Meeting

The Co-Op Committee composed of clergy and lay leaders of each faith community discuss the functioning of the faith partnership, coordination of collaborative projects, and other items affecting the faith communities. At the 27 June 24 meeting the following items were discussed:

September Meeting:

Prayer Rug: The placement of the Turkish rug given to Trinity on their pilgrimage to Ephesus was discussed. It will hang over the fireplace in the Fireside room.

Social-Eco Justice Letter: A concern was raised with a letter supported by the Social-Eco Justice team asking people to sign it and support legislation to keep asylum seekers from being evicted from their homes. The letter had the 301 logo as well as that of the individual congregations but approval was not received to use the logos from the 301 Co-Op and the faith communities. Co-Op endorsed that the use of such logos must go through the Co-Op and the decision-making bodies of the individual faith communities before they can be used.

Blessing of Animals: The blessing of animals will occur on 6 Oct at 11:45 am. with participation from Fr. Jed Hodorph (retired priest from St. Paul's), Pastor Rick, and Mother Rosean.

Progressive Flag on Electronic Sign: An image of the progressive flag with the words "All Are Welcome at the Table" was presented to Co-Op. Co-Op agreed to add the text and image to the existing 301 Faith Partners slide.

Trinity Survey: Eric, Trinity council president, informed the Co-Op about the roll-out of the Trinity survey in September and items being asked on the survey. It was noted that the survey is NOT a vote, just a means to gauge the congregation's views.

Continuing Discussion: What we Share in Common: Discussion continued on commonalities and differences among the three faith communities. A document highlighting this discussion is in the planning stages with the goal is to distribute the document to the members of the faith communities.

October Meeting:

Electronic Digital Sign: There have been problems adding additional digital posts to highlight special events at the church. A Co-Op member will look at the contract and try to determine what is available for tech support to resolve this problem. Reminder: for events to go on the digital sign, the Co-Op needs to approve the use of the digital sign for the event.

<u>Trinity Poll</u>: Eric Jurgenson provided a brief update on the poll results.

Sharing Staff: Discussed how to share staff when there is a common event among the 301 Faith Partners. It was determined to discuss the issue with members of the staff from the three faith communities.

Poster: Social-Eco Justice Ministry asked if posters on bias from the Interfaith Community could be hung in the fellowship hall. Co-Op agreed to the request.

Neuro-Divergent Inclusion: Mary of Magdala raised attention to how best to include neuro-divergent individuals in worship service and in our faith communities. Co-Op members are tasked with thinking about this issue for the next meeting.

Property Committee Team: A member from St. Paul's will be stepping down from the property committee.

Route to the Tabernacle: It is difficult to reach the tabernacle in the sanctuary of Trinity Church. Some of the faith communities keep elements in the tabernacle for visitation. This discussion also brought up the lack of handicap signs on the west side of the church.

As the calendar turns to November, it brings with it thoughts of Thanksgiving. A warm home, ample clothing, a working vehicle and food, both healthy and unhealthy, are always on the list. My son, who is smart and loving, is the very best thing that ever happened to me. I'm sad he lives further away now, but he's following a dream, which is exactly what he's supposed to do! I cherish my friends from all periods of my life, even back to high school. It's fabulous for our families because their children are getting so much individualized attention and we're able to create some very fun activities because of the lower numbers. Unfortunately, because of the lower numbers, our budget is very stressed. The Christmas wreath fundraiser has been in full swing to help us with the budget and we appreciate those who have helped TLC Preschool out by purchasing a wreath from us. The fundraiser is wrapping up on November 3rd, so we don't know yet how successful the fundraiser has been but thank you to those who have participated!

Another way to help TLC Preschool is by participating in the CCCC (Colorado Childcare Contribution Credit) program. The Child Care Contribution Credit program seeks to increase the quality of childcare in Colorado. The state allows you to take a 50% tax credit (of your donation) on your state income taxes when you donate to a qualified childcare program like TLC Preschool. Forms will be showing up in the Tidings or are available from the church office.

Despite the recent challenges, I continue to be so thankful to be a part of an amazing program at Trinity! I'm grateful to Tiffany Klijewski for being an enthusiastic and reliable assistant, to all the members of the current TLC Preschool board for their commitment and hard work for the preschool, to past preschool board members and congregation members who continue their support of our mission at Trinity, to the great church staff who are always supportive and encouraging of the preschool, to parishioners from St. Paul's and Mary of Magdala who have been very supportive of TLC Preschool, and most especially to Pastor Rick and Deacon Katie who, despite so much on their respective plates, continue to support me and the TLC Preschool mission, and who always offer enthusiastic chapel times for us! 301 FP Joint Ecological Team (JET) ECO Tip of the Month

We are now in the critical period of casting our votes for the 2024 election. Many across Colorado and the U.S. are discerning choices on issues and candidates which will shape our future for years to come. As we perform our civic duty to vote, it is important to consider the environment. The following excerpts from ELCA documents provide some helpful guidance for us to consider.

The 2020 Social Message on Government and Civic Engagement in the United States: Discipleship in a Democracy states "Lutherans care about government because it is a gift from God intended for the safety and flourishing of human life. Yet too often and in too many ways, this gift has been abused. Over time Lutherans have learned that energetic civic engagement is part of their baptismal vocation, both as individuals and through the church's corporate witness. Such civic participation is not simply voluntary, idealistic, or altruistic. The ELCA holds to the biblical idea that God calls God's people to be active citizens and to ensure that everyone benefits from the good of government (Jeremiah 29:7, Romans 13:1-7). We have the responsibility to raise our voices and votes against misuse of government. Discipleship in a democracy takes many forms. Examples include: • informed and regular voting • participation in government efforts such as the census • attending public meetings • public service as a government employee or in public office • involvement with political parties and campaigns • advocacy about particular issues • volunteering for public-service organizations • community organizing for social change • nonviolent protest"

The 2023 Social Message on <u>Earth's Climate Crisis</u> also states "In the Holy Scriptures, God assigns a sacred responsibility to human beings: we are to care for and keep God's creation for future generations. The ELCA first addressed this calling three decades ago by pairing environmental justice with social justice in the 1993 Social Statement <u>Caring for Creation: Vision, Hope, and Justice</u>. It also names climate change as a central environmental issue, one the ELCA has addressed to varying degrees. This social message is rooted in our duty to be responsible caretakers of God's creation. God assigns a sacred responsibility to human beings: we are to care for and keep God's creation for future generations. At the heart of this social message lies the claim that climate change presents humanity with a kairos moment; that is, a critical moment in time when God is leading us into decisive action.

Our Lutheran tradition says that God actively pursues the flourishing of life in human society in two ways—through the gospel and the law. As Redeemer of the world, God works through the church to proclaim the gospel and to promote mercy and reconciliation through proclamation of the word and administration of the sacraments. As Creator of the world, God uses civil authorities to restrain evil, establish a modicum of justice, and promote the common good through rule of law and use of reason. Given the systemic nature of the climate crisis, government and public policy are both key. Lutherans believe "government remains God's gift because it is intended to do what churches, families, individuals, and businesses cannot do on their own: protect and coordinate the wellbeing of individuals, communities, and creation. The litmus test for government action is whether our neighbor is being served and whether justice is being done."

Stewardship Campaign Update

There will be more information as we move forward, but currently we have 68 returned pledges with a total of **\$59,378** (*increase*). Thank you! For 50 years ELCA World Hunger has addressed long-term hunger issues by supporting sustainable development projects of local congregations around the world. As many as 811 million people are undernourished. Your gift matters - in Ghana, the United States, Tanzania, and other countries. As church, our calling is not merely to minister to our neighbors but to bear witness to the "new thing" God is doing in our world, a new community God is making possible. From health clinics to microloans, water wells to animal husbandry, community meals to advocacy, gifts to ELCA World Hunger enable the ELCA to respond during critical moments such as these, supporting sustainable solutions that get at the root causes of hunger and poverty.

In The Gambia, Anna participated in a cashew farming project supported by your gifts to ELCA World Hunger. The project is one of several initiatives aimed at building food security and creating new opportunities for Gambians. In this project, women and girls from rural areas with high rates of poverty learn how to grow and market cashew nuts for income. With the additional money, Anna can afford food, clothing, school fees for her children, and investments in her growing business. Anna's story is just one example of your generosity to ELCA World Hunger transforming a life and ushering in a future filled with hope.

ELCA Disaster Response Fund addresses shorter-term help for emergencies around the world. In the Holy Land, gifts to Lutheran Disaster Response have equipped it to respond to this and other disasters. Gifts designated for "Middle East Crisis" will be restricted to and used in full (100%) for those affected by this crisis. As first steps in a long-term response, the Disaster Response Fund supports:

- → Augusta Victoria Hospital, which procures medical supplies and provides accommodations for patients and staff unable to return to their homes in Gaza.
- → The Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land, which provides emergency education support for families who have lost income because of the war and are unable to pay school fees.
- → ACT Alliance, in partnership with Lutheran World Federation, responds to immediate needs for psychosocial support, shelter, household items, public health centers, and direct cash assistance for Palestinian communities in Gaza, East Jerusalem, and the West Bank.


Results of Sept 2024 Opinion Poll


This congregational opinion poll was a successful gathering of a statistical portion of the congregation. It was not a binding vote. The Council expects to bring an official proposal for the consideration of the congregation in the near future.

A strong majority (83%) are in favor of continuing to have a shared space relationship and a majority (68%) are in favor of a lease term longer than 2 years. The levels of Shared Worship and Shared Ministry seem to be satisfactory to most (no broad change is desired). And we have a good distribution of results pertaining to ministry passion that can guide thinking in paths forward. Many of these results may seem intuitive to us, but we have now collected the opinions all at one time, place, and manner.


Names were required for responses to be included in the poll results. There were only two nameless entries. Entries completed by a couple were doubled since the poll is a per member polling. There were four such entries.


