

## Your Gifts In Action ~ Food Bank For Larimer County

Food Bank for Larimer County's mission is to provide food to all in need through community partnerships and hunger-relief programs. They have set an ambitious goal to provide 12.2 million meals annually – more than a 60% increase by 2035. To meet that goal, the Food Bank has been expanding partnerships and adding new programming, including the current Mobile Pantries & Kids Café (known as The Lunch Lab) to expand the capacity and considering new opportunities for distributing food that will increase access to more neighbors needing food assistance both now and into the future.

A brief description of the programs: The Nourishing Network provides food to more than 120 nonprofit programs to distribute to their clients in need. Nourishing Network agency partners include food pantries, kitchens, shelters and snack programs that serve low-income populations. Nutritious Kitchen staff and volunteers work in our kitchen each day. It's thanks to their hard work we're able to prepare hundreds of thousands of fresh, from scratch, cooked meals for children and older adults (60 and older) in Larimer County every year. Cooking Matters works in communities across the country to help parents and caregivers develop their skills when shopping for and cooking healthy foods on a budget. This program offers cooking classes and nutrition training to coach participants how to shop for and to prepare healthy, low-cost meals. The Fresh Food Share No-Cost markets are our brick-andmortar shopping locations. Just like a grocery store, clients choose what they shop for. We offer a variety of fresh fruits, vegetables, bread, meat, dairy and shelf-stable items - all at no cost to you. Everyday Eats is tailored specifically to meet common senior nutrition needs. Seniors 60 years and older whose gross monthly household income is at or below the guidelines below can also qualify for Everyday Eats. Everyday Eats boxes, sometimes referred to as "senior boxes," are distributed to individuals once per month. You can donate more than just dollars - In partnership with the Gardens on Spring Creek, the Food Bank for Larimer County's Plant It Forward initiative is an effort to increase local produce donations from backyard gardeners. Community members are invited to plant an extra row in their gardens and when the crops are ready, drop them off at either the Food Bank for Larimer County or the Gardens on Spring Creek. No donation is too small!



#### **Pastor's Ponderings**

After this the Lord appointed seventy-two others and sent them on ahead of him in pairs to every town and place where he himself intended to go... ...yet know this: the kingdom of God has come near. (Luke 10:1;11b)

In the summer of 2002, there was a seminary outreach program in ELCA seminaries called Two by Two. Basically, two seminarians visited different Lutheran camps throughout the country recruiting future pastors, deacons, and other church leaders. While I had already decided on going to seminary, these folks helped solidify, affirm my decision, and answer my questions. Two by two.

Two by Two, is how Jesus does evangelism ministry with his volunteers – a transition from his mission of the twelve expanded to a mission of 72. He sends them in pairs to tell the story. To proclaim good news in scary places and cure the sick. To announce peace and receive hospitality. To shake dust off your feet when you are not welcomed as the stranger. To remember the kingdom of God is here. Two by two.

July of 2025, Trinity is also going into a time of discernment – decision making – expanded ministry and transition. Our Call Committee will be solidified by congregational vote and begin their work to find our next clergy person. The process is expected to take 3-6 months depending on who is available for call in our synod. Thank you to our 7 nominees who have volunteered to accept this position.

The good news is that Trinity is a vibrant congregation, and in good position to enter a call process. We are financially healthy. Our support staff is stable. Our Reconciling In Christ identity is lived out. Our council leadership is solid. Our partnership with two other congregations is strong. Our Call Committee is diverse. And over the last 2 years, we have gone through the hard work of determining what we want and need out of our pastoral leaders. Two by two.

Two by two, means we all do this ministry together – maybe in pairs, maybe as triads – but we rely on volunteers, to carry out this ministry by continuing to do what we have always done. From the call committee – to communion servers, you are part of these 72 that are the hands and feet of God. I too realize that I cannot be two clergy people at once and will rely on others to do share the load.

And we will see what God does through us in these next few months of uncertain hope and expectation. So that we may be welcome a new clergy person with the same hospitality and love that we were welcome with here at Trinity. And through this unknown time, we remind one another that God is near, God is here.



#### **Highlights from Co-Op Committee Meeting**

The Co-Op Committee, composed of clergy and lay leaders of each faith community, meeting monthly to discuss the functioning of the faith partnership, coordination of collaborative projects, and other items affecting the faith communities. At the June 12, 2025 meeting, the following items were discussed:

Representatives from the Family Housing Network, City of Fort Collins, and Catholic Charities attended the meeting to discuss how we could work together if we were to participate in the SafeLot program which would use our parking lot periodically to provide a safe place to 7-8 vetted individuals/families who shelter in their cars. Currently, Zion Lutheran Church and King of Glory Lutheran Church in Loveland partner together with this program. We will continue to gather information and discuss this among congregational leaders.

It was agreed that the Co-Op Committee would plan shared Adult Forums on Sundays that we have shared worship services.

We reviewed the process and procedures taken to improve the Oval Garden at our main entrance and clarified how similar initiatives should be implemented in the future. Many thanks to Dave Cloyd, the shared Property team and others who helped complete this project!

# 301 FP JET ECO Tip of the Month

<u>What is bat house?</u> Bat houses are wooden structures designed for housing and sheltering bats, both local and migratory bats! While they have some things in common with bird houses, they have a few unique features that make them safe and comfortable for our favorite flying mammals!

- + They have entrances on the bottom. This is so the bats can use all the space inside while hanging upside down and allows them to take flight out of the box without injury!
- They are usually taller and narrower than bird houses, with separate rooms inside so several bats can roost at once.
- The inside walls have grooves bats don't build nests, but they do need comfortable spots to put their feet to hang securely.

<u>Why would we need these?</u> Don't bats normally live outside? In cities, sick trees or trees at the end of their life span are often cut down before they can damage people or property – bats that might have roosted in these trees can shelter in bat boxes instead. Bat houses are most used as roosting sites by bat moms looking for places to raise their pups. Having safe roosting places can help keep bats out of areas frequented by humans, keeping us and them safe!

<u>I want to build a bat box!</u> Great! Bat boxes are simple structures, but they do have a few specific needs. <u>Fish and Wildlife Service</u> and the <u>Wildlife Trusts</u> both have excellent guides to building and placing bat boxes. Be sure to read the tips so the boxes you build can be safe and useful for our local bats! To learn more about bat houses and gardens, check out this article by <u>Bat Conservation International</u>.
