301 FP JET ECO Tip of the Month

As of 7/15/2025, six wildfires are burning in Colorado (<u>Inciweb.wildfire.gov</u>). According to the City of Fort Collins, smoke from wildfires is a significant source of air pollution and can impact air quality in our community even when a fire is miles away. An Air Quality Health Advisory is in effect for part of western Colorado.

The city of Fort Collins monitors air quality at <u>six locations</u>. This Air Quality Index summary includes both regulatory and non-regulatory monitors to be more representative of local conditions. Symptoms of smoke exposure include: Watering and irritated eyes, Coughing, Wheezing, Difficulty breathing. To minimize the effects of smoke in your house, read the <u>City of Fort Collins website</u>. <u>Check out wildfires across the U.S.</u> To check air quality, read the <u>Colorado Smoke Outlook</u>, or check <u>AirNow</u>.

The Joint Ecological Team (JET) meets as needed to plan educational events, bike to work day, volunteer opportunities, and advocacy. ISAAC envisions a Northern Colorado in which immigrants, asylum seekers, refugees and religious minorities, feel connected and supported, can thrive to maximum potential, and are recognized for the amazing contributions made to families, work places and the broader community AND a community in which people from diverse generations, cultural, linguistic and religious backgrounds learn to build meaningful connections and a sense of belonging, share their respective wisdoms and resources, find joy and common purpose, and are personally and collectively transformed through this sense of solidarity, mutual respect and care.

In 2024, love in action helped support:

145 scholarships for local families and individuals fighting complex legal cases.

Cash support and accompaniment for over a hundred local families experiencing a crisis such as a cancer diagnosis, accident or death of a loved one.

Project-development, leadership training and financial support for immigrants creating community-facing projects and LLCs based on their lived experience.

Conflict resolution training for tenants, mobile homeowners, landlords and managers, as we work to prevent evictions and create supportive communities.

Professional development fellowships at local host sites throughout the county for 30 immigrant and refugee youth ages 16-24; Need-based support for 70 first-generation higher education students mentoring K-12 newcomer youth.

Highlights from Co-Op Committee Meeting

The Co-Op Committee, composed of clergy and lay leaders of each faith community, meeting monthly to discuss the functioning of the faith partnership, coordination of collaborative projects, and other items affecting the faith communities. At the July 10, 2025 meeting, the following items were discussed:

Mother Rosaen and Paul Johnson reported on their conversations with representatives from King of Glory and Zion Lutheran in Loveland about their experience with the SafeLot program. Both shared very positive reports for volunteers, guests and their neighborhoods. After reviewing estimated initial and ongoing expenses, it was agreed that the next step would be to go to each congregation's governing bodies for consideration. A steering committee with 2 members from each congregation will probably be needed to lead this effort if approved by all 3 partners.

The next shared service is October 19. It was agreed to have a shared Adult Forum that Sunday featuring the first of 3 discussions on Martin Luther's "theology of the cross"; Bonhoeffer: reframing 'church' and liturgical renewal, led by James Gearhart.

More discussion was held on hosting the Interfaith Council's Our Neighbor's Faith program. A team consisting of members from all 3 congregations will be needed to plan and event to possibly host in early November.

Habitat For Humanity

Earlier this month, we toasted our farewell to over 130,000 cubic yards of "beet tailings" on land that will someday become the Tapestry Neighborhood built in partnership with Hartford Homes.

The Tapestry story starts back in 2022, when we learned that our longtime supporters, the Odell Family (of Odell Brewing), planned to donate their land adjacent to the brewery to Habitat. The land has a rich history as a part of Fort Collins' sugar beet industry. This raw land was a true gift, and it was also a true undertaking—because the soil could not be built on without removing the beet tailings – because they aren't solid enough to build on. Additionally, we would need to install all the necessary infrastructure, including curbs, gutters, utility lines, and more.

Habitat is a builder, not necessarily a developer--that's where Hartford Homes came in. They care deeply about our community and wanted an opportunity to build "missing middle" housing alongside our Habitat homes. In exchange, they entered into a partnership that made it possible.

I'm pleased to share that our "toast" was in celebration of the final project plans being submitted! This milestone marks an astonishing acknowledgment that Habitat hasn't paid for land, raw or developed. The impact of this generous collaboration will be the development of affordable condominiums in a prime location.

I hope you'll stay tuned as we begin construction on our 30-total Habitat homes at Tapestry, likely starting next summer.

The vision for the Tapestry community is to bring together people from diverse backgrounds, ages, and life stages to create a truly diverse and inclusive mixed-income community. We spent a lot of time talking about the history of the neighborhood which is adjacent Buckingham neighborhood and the larger Tres Colonias neighborhood, which historically housed laborers working in the area's nearby sugar beet fields. The hope is that these homes will make it possible for more people who work here to live here. You can learn more about the history of sugar beet farming and the extraordinary contributions of the farmers here.

When the search committee is ready to recommend a candidate, the congregation will have the opportunity to accept or reject by a vote in a special congregational meeting.

Pastor Rick asked us to support our search committee with our prayers and by answering any questions they might have.

A vote was taken on the complete search committee roster; The entire roster was accepted by a majority.
