Pastor Kaari's Kindling

My undergraduate degree is in English literature. For as long as I can remember, I've loved a good book, and diving into meaning and nuance in literature. I love looking at the way themes thread themselves through a story, and how an author deploys literary devices to weave a picture together in a way that seems almost tangible.

Though we sometimes forget, the Bible is as whole bunch of books put together. The authors weren't recording histories; they were telling the true stories of Jesus Christ. These ancient authors were no slouches. They were poetic, and intentional. They wove themes into the stories and used those same literary devices to pull us into the story so that we could understand better than just a purely historical recording.

The Gospel of John, which we've been working our way through since the beginning of this year, is no exception. One of the most prominent metaphors that John's author uses is that of light and darkness, where light symbolizes truth and understanding and a thriving relationship with Jesus (which John's author desperately wants for all people). Contrastingly, darkness symbolizes deception or lies, a lack of understanding, and a separation between humans and God.

As readers, something we must realize is that no metaphor is perfect. Metaphors, by their very definition, are figures of speech that try to give us a deeper understanding about something, but are not actually the thing they're describing. No metaphor can completely encompass what it is trying to give deeper understanding to.

The metaphor that John's author uses about light and darkness is not perfect, especially in our context of the 21st century United States. One measure of anti-racism that this congregation has done is to talk about the goodness, creative power, and comfort of darkness. This is especially important to recognize because in our context, in which slavery based on race and racism are such a large part of our history and current reality, always ascribing the negative or bad aspects to darkness can also apply to people's skin color. It's important that we shift our imaginations to also include the positive and beautiful aspects of darkness.

John's author did not live in the same context we do with the same history of slavery and racism based on skin color. Most of the people John's author would have encountered and that were reading the Gospel of John would have been dark skinned people native to the Palestinian region. The metaphor John's author uses of light and darkness wouldn't have carried any racial connotation in that context.

Our Lenten theme this year is Dancing in the Darkness, based in part off the book by Rev. Dr. Otis Moss III. In this theme, we reflect the metaphor used in the Gospel of John, where darkness is that in the world which separates us from God, that which deceives us, that which steals compassion and love and empathy from the world. And in our Lenten theme, we'll build resilience to be able to see God's goodness, life, and beauty- to find the courage to dance- even amidst the darkness.


At the same time, we understand that this metaphor is not perfect and cannot completely describe the world around us. Darkness is not always bad. Light is not always good. Just as darkness can be holy and beautiful, light can be scorching and burning. As Lutherans and as people of paradox, we can hold this metaphor and the understanding that it is not complete together.

As we continue through Lent, I invite you to continue to explore this metaphor- how can we dance in the midst of darkness? And also, to hold the understanding that it is not complete in itself.

Dancing in the Darkness Lenten Invitation

Dancing in the darkness means refusing to let the hard things in our world overwhelm or bury us. It does not mean ignoring the hard, evil, or brutal things in our world to instead live in ignorance. Instead, it means looking at the truth of our reality, and choosing still to dance in the midst of them: to resist, to find joy, to celebrate community, to imagine a better reality- one that Jesus calls us into. Below is an invitation to a prayer practice, and at-home reflection questions to talk about with your family/friends/whoever you live with!



Lenten Prayer Practice: Together with our 301 Faith Partners, we'll join in prayer during the season of Lent. You'll find a large cross just outside the worship space with purple ribbons next to it. You're invited to take a ribbon, pray with it and/or write your prayer on the ribbon, and tie it to the cross. You can pray for the places you see darkness, you can pray for the ways you danced in the darkness or you saw others dancing in the darkness, you can pray for sometime entirely unrelated to our Lenten theme but that is on your heart! The cross will be up all of Lent to hold our collective prayers during this season.

Use the questions below for at-home discussion, and keep an eye on the weekly e-News for week-specific invitations.

At-Home Reflection Questions

- ✦ What felt heavy this week? What truth was revealed that wasn't so beautiful?
- ✦ Where did you experience joy this week? Where did you see resistance? How did you dance in the darkness?

Read the Biblical story from the week:

- ✦ Where did you see darkness? Either in the way empire tried to twist the narrative, or in the way a brutal truth was revealed?
- ✦ Where did you see a character dancing in the darkness? Be it Jesus, or someone else! What new reality did Jesus reveal or invite us into?

Salud is a Federally Qualified Health Center (FQHC) and 501©3 nonprofit. In Colorado they operate 13 clinic locations, 10 school sites and a mobile unit. Health centers provide much-needed primary and preventive services, including medical, dental, pharmacy and behavioral health care. Their focus is on low-income, medically underserved populations. **Salud** offers a sliding fee scale based on family size and income. Their doors are open to everyone – families and children, farmworkers and the homeless, and those who are uninsured, on Medicaid, or have private insurance. Insurance enrollment assistance is available.

Hard-to-recycle items Timberline Recycling Center takes hard-to-recycle items, and you don't have to be a resident of Fort Collins. The following items accepted with no-fee payment: antifreeze, used motor oil, and plastic bags and film. For these items, a \$5 entry fee: aggregates, baling twine, bulky rigid plastic, cooking oil, fire extinguishers, scrap metal. Additional fees plus the \$5 entry fee for: electronics (computers, TV), wood waste, yard trimmings. Study their website for more information. Open Tuesday through Saturday. CHaRM on the Road at Ecocycle (Boulder) also take hard-to-recycle items – large appliances, pallets, small appliances, lab plastics, solar panels, and more. There associated fees. Check out [their website](#).

Highlights from Co-Op Committee Meeting

The Coop Committee, composed of clergy and lay leaders of each faith community, meeting monthly to discuss the functioning of the faith partnership, coordination of collaborative projects, and other items affecting the faith communities. At the February 12, 2026 meeting, the following items were discussed:

A congregational pledge from apartheid-free.org was presented for us to consider. The 3 congregations will take it to their leadership for consideration.

Signs of Solidarity butterfly posters from Social Eco Justice were emailed to committee members with the request to post them on the exterior doors of the church. There were no objections raised to doing so.

Issues with the sound board and auxiliary speakers in the family breakroom and nursery were discussed. It was decided to try to take care of this internally before exploring professional resources.

The recent neighbor open house regarding SafeLots was discussed. Due to some strong objections, the consensus is that we'll probably need to take more time than anticipated to implement this here. There will be more discussion about SafeLots at the shared adult forum on February 15.

Congregational affirmations of the 301 Faith Partners Covenant are proceeding and expect to be finalized by our next meeting.

Welcome Steps for ushers and greeters have been distributed.

Spring clean up day is scheduled for March 28.


