First Word: As the morning sun rose, the soldiers stripped Jesus and the prisoners of their clothes. They dressed them in orange jumpsuits, fashioned a crown of barbwire for their heads, and beat them. They were forced to carry a heavy cross through the streets to be crucified. The cross was used to strike fear in the people's hearts; it said, "Fall in line. Don't challenge authority. Keep silent." The soldiers and crowds taunted the prisoners as Jesus was nailed to the cross. As it was raised in place, Jesus spoke: "**Father, forgive them, for the do not know what they are doing.**"

Second Word: Jesus was placed between those condemned who were also being hanged. One of them berated Jesus saying, "Are you not the Messiah? Save yourself and us! Show your power." Another criminal chastised the first saying, "Do you not fear God? Unlike us, this man has done nothing wrong." Turning his head toward Jesus, he said. "Remember me, when you come into your kingdom." Jesus replied, "**Truly I tell you, today you will be with me in paradise.**"

Third Word: As Jesus hung from the cross, he gazed down and saw his mother weeping along with many of his followers who were outraged by the inhumane treatment of Jesus and all the other people detained. The disciple he loved was also there. Jesus spoke to them, "**Woman, here is your son.**" Then he said to the disciple, "**Here is your mother.**"

Fourth Word: At high noon a great darkness covered the whole land like a blanket until three in the afternoon. Those in power wondered if they had made a mistake in persecuting Jesus and the people detained. They hid in fear from the people calling for justice. Jesus cried out with a loud voice, "**Eloi, Eloi lema sabachthani?**" which means, "**My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?**"

Fifth Word: After his plea, Jesus knew that he had stood in solidarity with the people he loved, as the ancient Sacred Scriptures had said. Close to death and so scripture might be fulfilled he spoke again in a dry, rasping voice, "**I am thirsty.**"

Sixth Word: A soldier offered Jesus a cup of bitter wine, a last meal of a kind. Jesus gulped some of the wine to ease his throat, and spluttered when it was too much. Then Jesus looked out at the followers detained with him and up at the heavens and spoke, "**It is finished.**"

GOOD FRIDAY

On Good Friday, Christians remember Jesus' crucifixion and death. Through the cross, God shared human suffering and death; through the resurrection, death and evil are emptied of their power. As we reflect on Jesus' death through Faure's Requiem, a traditional mass for the dead, we remember God's love in Jesus that extended to the gift of his life. As we pray at the cross, we look toward Easter and the promise and reality of resurrection: life that conquers death, love that conquers hatred, and justice that conquers evil, for us and for all the world.



GATHER IN SILENCE

WELCOME

PRAYER OF THE DAY

L: Let us pray.

A brief silence is kept before the prayer.

L: Almighty God, look with loving mercy on your family, for whom our Lord Jesus Christ was willing to be betrayed, to be given over to the hands of sinners, and to suffer death on the cross; who now lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, forever and ever.

C: **Amen.**

PASSION OF JESUS:

In the morning, after Jesus was arrested in garden – the elders and scribes commanded Jesus be led away, and handed over to Pilate. Pilate questioned him. Pilate tried to release a prisoner. Pilate asked the crowd what should be done to Jesus. Pilate handed him over to be crucified.

Kerrie Anderson— The soldiers clothed him in a purple cloak, twisted a crown of thorns, mocked him...beat him, led him out, to crucify him, to a place called Golgotha. It was nine o'clock in the morning when they crucified him. As the cross was set in place, those who crucified him taunted him. Jesus raised his head and said: **Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing.**

Mother Rosean Amaral— One of the criminals who were hanged there kept deriding him and saying, “Are you not the Messiah? PASSION OF JESUS

While Jesus was speaking in the Garden, those in power came searching for him, their flashlights shining bright, pepper spray that burned the eyes of Jesus and his followers at the ready. Jesus was handed over to them and led away to Pilate, while many of the people were detained also. It was a long night of questioning and eventually those in power were able to sway the court of public opinion. They cried, “Crucify him, Crucify them.”

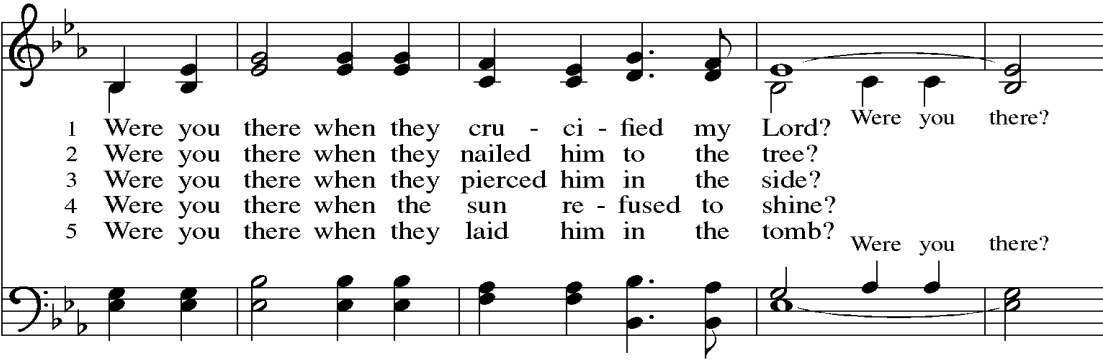

VENERATION/ADORATION OF THE CROSS

‘In the 4th Century a Spanish nun named Etheria made a pilgrimage to the Holy Land. She was in Jerusalem during Holy Week and went to every service and wrote down the details of the liturgies. Her journal became the source of introducing these Jerusalem Holy Week liturgies to the western church. One of those customs at the Good Friday liturgy was the veneration of the cross, a time when people came forth to be at the foot of the cross to pray, to have a quiet time, to offer a thanksgiving for Jesus’ love and gift to us of his life.’

During the singing of the hymn you are welcome to come forward to venerate the cross. You may take rose petals from the basket and place them on the cross. You may also visit the Stations of the Cross along the back walls of the sanctuary.
