Pastor Kaari's Kindling

When I was 14, I had the opportunity to go to the ELCA National Youth Gathering in New Orleans. My older brothers had been before and raved about it. I loved church a whole heck of a lot more than they did, so I had high expectations. High expectations can be dangerous sometimes- it's easy to be disappointed when we place too much on a person or an event. However, my expectations were not disappointed! Even with some setbacks...

Now, I'll be the first to admit that I'm a little bit clumsy, and that proved true when we stopped in Texas for the night on our drive from Longmont to New Orleans. I drowsily stepped off our bus and my ankle immediately crumpled beneath me. We thought it was okay... until the next night. We'd made it to New Orleans, but my ankle was so swollen that Pastor Paul Judson took my older brother and me to the closest ER for xrays in the middle of the night. God bless Pastor Paul Judson for putting up with me for so many years. Luckily, it was just a bad sprain. Unluckily, it was a bad sprain at the beginning of the National Youth Gathering. Even when I was in pain, even when I couldn't participate in all of the activities, the National Youth Gathering transformed my perspective.

There was an energy of being gathered with (at that gathering) 30,000 high school students. We listened to diverse speakers. I saw strong female pastors unapologetically proclaiming the Gospel. My perspectives were broadened by the radical messages of God's love and grace in the world, and I realized how much I loved this church. It was simultaneously a testament to what the church was in that moment, and also a vision to me of what the church could be. Joyful. Radical. Full of energy. Unapologetic. Full of love and grace.

While there are many pieces that I would say encouraged my discernment to ministry (especially camp and campus ministry), the National Youth Gathering is definitely a piece of my journey. It gave me the ability to imagine more.

Next summer, in June-July of 2027, the ELCA National Youth Gathering is being hosted in Minneapolis, MN. We will be taking a group! You may be reading this and say, "Well, seems like this only applies to high school students," but I am here to tell you, dear reader, dear church, that a trip like this doesn't happen without the full community's support! First and foremost, please pray for our high school students, always, but also especially in the leadup to this trip. Don't be afraid, especially as we get closer, to ask students about it! Are they going? What are they excited about? Maybe share about your experience at a National Youth Gathering or other faith trip you took as a teenager. Secondly, and more tangibly, these trips are expensive. Between registration costs, hotel costs, travel costs, and food, we're estimating that it'll be between \$1800-\$1900 for each person. That said, there will be fundraising in our future! Please keep a look out come fall for fundraising events, and thanks in advance for your generosity.

Ways to Give at Trinity

Become a Realm giver! Call the office to get an invite to REALM, our new giving platform. In Realm you can donate from a checking account, savings account or your credit card. Donations can be done weekly, monthly, or annually. Also, you can look at the history of your giving and even print a statement for your taxes. Check it out!

For **One-Time Donations** go to www.trinitylutheranfc.org and click on “Give” at the top of the webpage. Find One-time Donation and follow the prompts from there. Again, you can have the donation come from a checking account, savings account or your credit card.

Are **charitable rollovers** an option for you? If you are required to take a minimum distribution from your IRA, you might be able have the check payable to Trinity, and not pay taxes on the distribution (please check with your tax advisor, or financial institution). The same applies if you have a charitable donor advised fund. Check with your financial institution on the frequency that works best for you.

Does your bank offer their customers a **bill paying option**? You can check with your bank about this. Some banks do not charge for this convenience. Have **automatic deductions** from your checking or savings account, done weekly, bi-monthly, or monthly.

Have the Venmo app? Trinity is also on Venmo! We are “Trinity-LutheranFC”.

Use Regular Offering **Envelopes**-either brought to worship or mailed in.

Home Food Scrap Composting and the Compost Queen pilot program

ZERO Waste is one of three City of Fort Collins 2030 climate goals: “Reach zero waste so nothing goes to landfills. Materials are reused, recycled or composted instead”

So – let’s focus on COMPOSTING - WHAT is Composting? Composting is the process of turning organic material such as plant debris and food scraps into a soil amendment through the use of an aerobic process that requires water, carbon and nitrogen.

WHY should we compost? Composting keeps yard debris and food scraps out of the landfill and helps improve soil health. You may already be familiar with “Yard Waste” pick up (or drop off) in your community. But what about food scraps?

HOW can we compost food scraps in Northern Colorado? Food scraps can be composted in backyard composting systems or can be collected by a subscription composting service (two local options below).

Food waste should never be included in curbside recycling bins or in bins at recycling drop-off centers. Too much food waste in a recycle bin can cause an entire truckload of recyclables to be rejected and thrown away into the trash!

City of Fort Collins Food Waste Composting Pilot Program: In order to reach their Zero Waste 2030 goal, The City of Fort Collins is partnering with Compost Queen in a Food Waste Composting Pilot Program through October 2026. They are collecting data on adoption rates, pricing models, collection volumes, processing needs and more. The program is funded through the \$.10 bag fee collected as a part of the City’s Disposable Bag Ordinance. The pilot program is anticipated to divert an additional 165 tons of organics from the landfill during its 12-month run, preventing more than 100 metric tons of CO₂-equivalent emissions the same as eliminating 250,000 miles of vehicle emissions. Habitat For Humanity There is exciting news going on for Habitat for Humanity in Ft. Collins. The Harmony Cottages are now completely built out and HH is now building in Bloom on Mulberry Street! There are 40 units in Bloom that will be dedicated Habitat homes! Habitat is moving forward celebrating 17 homes in the last year, and 125 homes since the beginning of the organization's founding in 1993! That's great news for families looking for the stability that homeownership can provide. In addition, Habitat Ft. Collins has applied and received approval to become a Colorado Enterprise Zone in Bloom. That means that donations over \$250 through Faith Builds to Habitat For Humanity in Ft. Collins are eligible for a 25% state tax credit. According to Mara Johnson, Chief Development Officer, "this is a way to give more impactfully your gift goes further because you receive a significant state tax credit on top of your normal deduction." Another reason to celebrate Habitat for Humanity Ft. About Stork Support: serves newborns and their families in Larimer and Weld County. A small non-profit, we are 100% volunteer run and donation based. We have recently moved out of a garage and are now housed in a room in the church basement of First United Methodist Church in Windsor. We concentrate on the third and fourth trimester needs of under-resourced Northern Colorado families providing material support including maternity clothes, baby clothes, postpartum supplies, newborn essential kits, strollers and safe sleep options. On average, we serve 8 newborn babies a month. We work to ensure that every new family has a strong start. Over the course of the baby's first year we also offer some infant formula and diapers as our capacity and financing allows. The infant feeding program is our most expensive offering. 10 days of formula now costs about \$115.

Council Meeting March 17

This meeting was held via Zoom set up by Pastor Kaari. Those present on this Zoom call: Paul Johnson, Pastor Kaari Nieuwlandt, Shelley Aust, Joey Prows, Soren Nicholson, Linda Cavazos, and Barbara Lambert. Paul called the meeting to order via Zoom at 6:30PM. Devotions were offered by Paul regarding a 'Healthy Congregation'. February Council Minutes were presented from February and Joey moved to accept the minutes. Linda seconded. All approved.

Discussion then went to the Congregational Meeting minutes which had been submitted in draft form to the council. The actual wording for the recommended motion as presented to the congregation for the FY25 excess was provided by Joey, via email from Eric, will be revised to read: or "To pay out of last year's surplus \$6,319 toward benevolence pro-rata, and save the remaining \$30,044 in reserve for Capital needs. Next, we went to the February Financial Report previously sent out by Joey, 3 pages with a graph. Soren moved to accept this Report and Shelley seconded it. All approved this report. At this point Joey realized that the Financial Report was the wrong one and at this meeting resent the correct one. There was a friendly motion to approve these minutes. All approved.

It was suggested to amend Cash Flow to all giving units. A message was suggested to be presented to the congregation to encourage giving. Linda asked about the budget for Hospitality and Evangelism. It was stated that the budget as presented is the budget.

Kathy updated us on the Keyboard that had been offered to the church. Worship and Music voted to accept the keyboard. Discussion went to the piano in Room 2A needing to be replaced. It was suggested that Tessa, Director of Chancel Choir, might be able to advise.

There are 2 trees that are 'down' and uprooted from the storm this last Thurs.as discussed by Soren. These are large trees by the Memorial Garden. Although this will allow for new trees, the cost to have these trees removed are high, \$4800 for one and \$5400 for the other. These are from Wisdom Tree Care. Mary Magdala personnel had provided an email for another estimate as well as Pastor Kaari said her brother had also offered help. As there is no hurry to have these removed, it was suggested that we wait a bit until the current demand for tree removal companies lessens and removal becomes more affordable. Soren then went on to discuss the issue of the furnace replacement. He has found the schematics of the original furnace which may help with estimates from companies. More to follow once he received more bids and/or rebids due to the schematics.

On the first Tuesday of the month, Barbara will solicit Committee Reports. This will allow time for the Exec Board to review and help with the agenda for the next Council meeting.

Shelley made the motion to adjourn. Joey seconded. All approved.

Highlights from Co-Op Committee Meeting

The Coop Committee, composed of clergy and lay leaders of each faith community, meeting monthly to discuss the functioning of the faith partnership, coordination of collaborative projects, and other items affecting the faith communities. At the April 9, 2026 meeting, the following items were discussed:

There hasn't been any follow up work done yet with the sound system speakers. Chad Carpenter has been hired to replace Claire Pickerel whose last day as our AV Technician will be May 17.

Planning continues on efforts to improve neighborhood relationships.

We spend some time to review Holy Week services to discuss what went well and ways we might want to improve them.

David Cloyd from Mary of Magdala reported that their Leadership Council has reviewed the 2020 Coop document and encouraged Trinity and St. Paul's to do the same. He previously emailed other members of the committee those results.

Trinity's Bell Choir has asked about possible changes with the Spiritual Direction space they currently share. It was agreed that an alternate space for Spiritual Direction can probably be arranged which would give the bell choir more room.

Pastor Kaari asked if the 301 Partners were interested in having a booth at the FoCo Pride event on June 6th at Lincoln Park. It was agreed that the 3 congregations would take turns paying the \$100 fee that Mary of Magdala will pay this year, and all 3 congregations would recruit volunteers to man the booth.
